

North Carolina Society C.A.R. 2015-2016 Yearbook, State Program, and Handbook

The goal for this year's State President's Project, Foundations of Freedom" is for our N.C.S.C.A.R. members to build an awareness and an understanding of our founding documents, the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution. In 1861, President Abraham Lincoln described the Declaration of Independence as an "apple of gold" and the Constitution as the "frame of silver" around it. The Constitution acts as a guard for the principles established in the Declaration of Independence. Many young people today might find it difficult to recall anything about either of these documents. For this upcoming year, Foundations of Freedom will educate N.C.S.C.A.R. members about these two documents that our country was founded on. "Pocket Constitutions" will be distributed to every C.A.R. member in our State to help them learn more about our Foundations of Freedom.

Since the focus of the project is education, funds raised beyond the cost of shipping and handling will be donated to the Robert B. Fleming, Jr. Memorial Scholarship Fund, which was established many years ago in memory of Robert. This \$1,000 scholarship is awarded annually to a C.A.R. member whose lifestyle reflects the character traits exemplified by Robert during his short life (1970-1983). A member may apply for the scholarship at the beginning of his/her senior year in high school and may continue to apply through age 21. The desire is to add to this fund so that this award can be given for many years to come to assist a student with college expenses.

- Send annual **National** dues (\$20), Sr. Society President's annual fee (\$10), and *C.A.R. Magazine* subscriptions (\$8 per annual subscription) to the Sr. National Treasurer, N.S.C.A.R. postmarked by January 1, 2016, using the Treasurer's Report Form Send a copy to the Sr. State Treasurer.
- Members pay annual **State** and **National** dues through the year in which their 22nd birthday occurs.

STATE TREASURER (cont.)

- NATIONAL **Life** members continue to pay annual STATE dues through the year in which their 22nd birthday occurs.
- Send local society donations to the Sr. National Treasurer, N.S.C.A.R., post-marked by February 29, 2016, using the Local Society Donation Form. Send a copy to the Sr. State Treasurer.
- Send fees for National Promoters and Life Promoters and donations for pins to the Sr. National Treasurer, N.S.C.A.R.

APPLICATION FEES AND DUES:

- Applicants pay \$35 (\$15 application fee and \$20 national dues).
- When two or more children apply (same time, same parents, and identical lineage) first child pays \$35; second child pays \$30 (\$10 application fee and \$20 national dues.)
- Send application and check or credit card information to the Sr. National Treasurer N.S.C.A.R.
- Admissions after July 1 are considered paid for the ensuing calendar year.

TRANSFER TO ANOTHER LOCAL SOCIETY OR TO MEMBER AT LARGE:

To transfer, a member writes a request to the Sr. Society President and sends a copy to the Sr. National Treasurer, N.S.C.A.R.

A transfer certificate is issued only for a member who has paid dues for the current year. The transfer becomes effective upon issuance of the transfer certificate by the Sr. National Treasurer to the Sr. Society President.

RESIGNATION:

Membership status may be altered only by the member, the member's parent or legal guardian, and the Sr. National Treasurer.

A letter of resignation must be sent by the member to the Sr. Society President who immediately sends it to the Sr. National Treasurer.

Local societies may not drop members. Only the Sr. National Treasurer drops members for nonpayment of dues. The Sr. National Treasurer notifies the Sr. Society President of members dropped.

CERTIFICATE ATTESTING MEMBERSHIP FOR DAR, SAR, OR S.R.:

- -N.S.C.A.R. encourages dual membership in DAR, SAR, and S.R.
- -A C.A.R. certificate attesting membership is issued only to a member who has paid dues for the current year.

The member or the Sr. Society President requests a certificate attesting membership from the Sr. National Treasurer at C.A.R. National Headquarters.

The certificate is valid for one year from the date of issue or until the member's 22nd birthday, whichever comes first.

Please make checks payable to N.S.C.A.R.

STATE TREASURER (cont.)

Applicants need to submit only **ONE** copy of the application. Applications are approved when verified.

The State Treasurer and Sr. State Treasurer would like to remind you to:

Send annual NATIONAL dues to the Sr. National Treasurer, N.S.C.A.R. postmarked by January 1, 2016, using the Treasurer's Report form.

Send annual STATE dues to the Senior State Treasurer postmarked by January 1, 2016. Please use the State Treasurer's Report. Societies must file their 990-N by July 15th each year!

Send fees for State Patriots, Life Promoters, and donations for pins to the Sr. State Treasurer, N.C.S.C.A.R.

GUIDELINES For STATE AND LOCAL SOCIETY SCRAPBOOKS

- 1. So that all scrapbooks will cover the same time period, each book should begin March 1, 2015, and end February 29, 2016.
- 2. Each scrapbook should be in chronological order.
- 3. The scrapbook should reflect the work of the C.A.R. member Historian, with advice from the Senior Historian.
- 4. Information to be on the inside front cover:

Name and title of the C.A.R. member who compiled the scrapbook.

Name, title, and address of the senior who served as the advisor for the book.

- 5. The name of the local society and the year should appear on the front cover.
- 6. The name of the local society, year, and names and photos of the Society President and Senior Society President should appear on the first page.
- 7. Pictures and other supplements should have a written explanation of the event, places, dates and people involved (as much as possible).
- 8. All material in the book must be fastened securely to a page in the book.
- 9. Each newspaper article should include the dateline from the publication and the publication's name wherever possible.

Scrapbooks will be judged on general appearance, neatness, originality and arrangement of materials. Scrapbooks will NOT be judged on how many other (non-Historian) contests are completed and shown, as there are other awards given for each contest.

This year we have worked to unite two cultures not only from our state but also from my heritage, and offer children an education that will help them to carry on the flame of their ancestry, the way we at C.A.R. do. Recent studies have shown that Cherokee is now considered a dead language. A key component in rebuilding the fire of the Cherokee nation is the New Kituwah Academy. Beginning in 2004 as a mere one room school with only 7 students the New Kituwah Academy sparked a flame of hope for the Cherokee people and their heritage. New Kituwah now serves 90 children and only admits those who will carry on their learning at home with their families. Although privately funded, the academy makes sure that every class, including the infant and toddler care rooms have a Cherokee speaker to aid in teaching. Attending the New Kituwah Academy is an invaluable opportunity for 90 children to carry on the culture of their people and our state. It provides children with self-confidence, pride in their heritage, education, and a support system for the rest of their lives

This State President was very busy this year travelling across the state, and east coast to support "Rebuilding the Fire" and "O! Say Can You See". She was excited to host two State Board meetings, in Cherokee and in High Point, North Carolina. She was very proud to see the hard work the members of her state put in to support the State Project. Through everyone's hard work N.C.S.C.A.R. raised a grand total of \$6,041.00 and several hundred dollars' worth of school supplies. This will greatly aid the academy as they add a middle school this year. It has been a pleasure serving as North Carolina's State President this year as our State Society "Rebuilt the Fire".

The North Carolina Society Children of the American Revolution has had an eventful and successful year as we have strived to "Rebuild the Fire" of the State Society as well as promoting the New Kituwah Academy in Cherokee. It was a joy to work with State President, Alexandria Swaim, to support her State Project. The two goals of this administration are education and communication. By teaching the members and senior leaders the responsibilities of their positions, the future of this organization will be in good hands. Communication is the key to keeping everyone informed of upcoming events and sharing the activities of the local societies. The *Tarheel Tattler* newsletter has been an excellent tool to accomplish this.

Members enjoyed attending the Southeastern Regional Meeting in Peachtree City, Georgia in July where they participated in skits presented by the National officers to highlight the focus and contests for the various committees. Part of the event was a tour of "Noah's Ark Animal Sanctuary" where they house over 1000 animals of all species that have been abused, neglected or abandoned and provide rehabilitation services.

Many miles were travelled attending DAR District Meetings and Fall Forums in July and August to sell merchandise to benefit the State Project. DAR chapters that sponsor C.A.R. societies were also visited. This Sr. State President would like to thank all the Senior leaders across the State and the many DAR chapters that made donations and provided school supplies in support of the C.A.R. State project.

Winter Board was held at the High Point Museum in November. State chairmen gave their reports and this officer conducted a training session on the State and National websites. Attendees learned how to navigate both sites and what information was available there

SAR wreath laying ceremonies were attended in Washington, NC, where they honored the patriots of the men who started the first SAR chapter in North Carolina; in Huntersville to celebrate the 234th Anniversary of the Battle of Cowan's Ford; and in Greensboro to celebrate the Anniversary of the Battle of Guilford Courthouse.

The annual State Conference was held in Raleigh March 20-22, 2015, including a Debutante presentation with 5 lovely young ladies being presented. The SAR Color Guard participated in the event. This conference had the largest attendance of any in the last several years.

Six members and 11 seniors attended National Convention in Arlington, Virginia, where we brought home the Gold Award for the State President and the Joel Lane Society.

HANDBOOK

of the NORTH CAROLINA SOCIETY CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Section 1 Dues and Fees

- 1.1 The annual dues of the State Society, as outlined in Article XIII, Section 1 of the State Society Bylaws, shall be ten dollars (\$10)
- 1.2 The annual Senior Society President's fee, as outlined in Article XIII, Section 2 of the State Society Bylaws, shall be ten dollars (\$10). In addition, there is a National Senior Society President's fee of ten dollars (\$10).
- 1.3 The State Patriot's fee, as outlined in Article XIII, Section 3 of the State Society Bylaws, shall be ten dollars (\$10) annually. This fee shall be collected by the Senior State President and deposited in the General Fund. The Senior State Treasurer shall periodically or upon request send a check to the Senior State President for the amount of State Patriot fees collected to offset expenses. State Patriot's receive a subscription to the Tarheel Tattler for the year they pay the State Patriot's fee.
- 1.4 By motion of the Board, the State Society may pay registration fee for members attending National Convention after verification of attendance by the Sr. State President.
- 1.5 Awards—By motion of the Board, there is a \$10 maximum award for all contests. Each Senior officer or chairman pays \$10 toward the awards amount to the Sr. Awards Chairman regardless of whether they have a contest winner. If you are a Sr. Society President and have paid your fee, you don't have to pay again. The member officer or chairman pays nothing. If the total collected does not add up to the total awards amount, the balance comes from the General Fund. If the total adds up to more than that needed for awards, the balance goes into the General Fund.
- 1.6 By motion of the Board, the Sr. State President may receive up to \$150 per year from the General Fund to assist with expenses of the position.
- 1.6 The State Society will pay for the Honorary State President's neck ribbon ONLY as a gift for the outgoing State President if they are elected an Honorary at the end of their term. The member must pay for the pin and insignia to go on the ribbon.

Section 2 Funds

The Senior State Treasurer maintains the following funds in the name of the

State Society:

- 2.1 General Fund (checking account) annual dues, fees and other income constitute the General Fund to be used for the legitimate expenses of the State Society. The Senior State Treasurer prepares an annual budget for the State Society to be presented at Summer Board for approval. All expenditures not budgeted or designated must be approved by the Senior State Board or the Senior State President.
- 2.2 General Fund (CD)—A portion of General Fund monies were put into a Certificate of Deposit to earn more interest.
- 2.3 Fleming Scholarship Fund (CD)—specifically for the payment of the Fleming Scholarship annually. The Fleming Scholarship award is \$1,000 to be awarded to the winner annually until the Fund is depleted or the principle is increased and interest earned on the Fund provides an award of \$1,000 or more. Applicants must apply for the Scholarship. (Revised August 2013)
- 2.4 State President's Fund (CD)—designated to assist the State President in expenses during the year. A \$500 award is paid to the **newly installed** State President after returning from National Conven-

tion in

April to be paid annually from the principle of the Fund until it is depleted. (Revised August 2013)

Section 3 State President's Project

- 3.1 The newly elected State President shall present his/her proposed project to the Senior State Board including estimated cost.
- 3.2 No State Society funds may be used to support expenses of or donations to the State President's Project regardless of whether the minimum is met or not.

Section 4 State Conference

4.1 It has been customary for the State Society to pay for two night's lodging and luncheon and banquet for the State and Sr. State President during State Conference.

Section 5 Debutante Presentation

- 5.1 A female member in good standing is eligible to be presented as a debutante at 18 years of age or a senior in high school through the age of 21 years.
- 5.2 The Debutante Presentation will be included as part of the Awards Banquet at State Conference as long as there are at least four eligible young ladies to be presented.
- 5.3 The debutante fee is \$275 with an early fee of \$250 if participants register by October 1st. This fee shall be set so that the debutante

presentation is at least self supporting (no additional funds are required from the General Fund or State Conference income). The Senior Debutante Chairman is responsible for tracking expenses versus income of each presentation and recommending changes to the Senior State Board.

Section 6 Robert B. Fleming, Jr. Scholarship

- 6.1 The Fleming Scholarship is administered by the Senior State Vice President with assistance from the State Vice President. That administration includes:
 - Ensuring Fleming Scholarship information is included in the *State Program Packet and Handbook* annually.
 - Provide application forms to members on request.
 - Receive and validate applications.
 - Prepare information for judging (see judging section below for details).
 - Announce the Fleming Scholarship winner at State Conference (unless the Senior State Vice President's child has applied for the scholarship; in which case, a neutral party will be designated to announce the winner).
 - Arrange for checks to be issued to the winner.
- 6.2 Judging
 - 6.2.1 The judges shall be selected by the Senior State Vice President of the N.C.S.C.A.R.
 - 6.2.2 The application, essay, personal statement and letter of recommendation will be submitted to the Senior State Vice President who will send them to the judges with the applicant's name removed.
- 6.2.3 The judges' final decision shall be submitted to the Senior State Vice President who will announce the winner at the N.C.S.C.A.R. State Conference.

6.3 Scholarship winners will be awarded the amount designated in Section 2.3. Checks shall be made payable to the winner and presented at State Conference or Summer Board depending on fund availability. The amount of the award may be changed periodically by vote of the members and approved by seniors to better reflect available funds and actual college expenses.

Section 7 Revisions

Recommendations for revisions or additions to this Handbook may be made and voted on at any State Board meeting during the year and forwarded to the Senior State Board for approval.

Updated August 2013

Objective

The objective of this Society as stated in Article II of the National Bylaws is:

- (1) To acquire knowledge of American History.

- (4) To promote the celebration of patriotic anniversaries.
- (5) To honor and cherish the flag of the United States of America above every other flag.
- (6) To love, uphold, and extend the principles of American liberty and patriotism.

Eligibility

Any boy or girl under the age of twenty-one years is eligible for membership in the National Society of the American Revolution who is linearly descended from a man or woman who, with unfailing loyalty, rendered material aid to the cause of American Independence as a soldier, sailor, civil officer, or recognized patriot in one of the several Colonies or States, or of the United States, provided that the applicant is personally acceptable to the Society. (Article III, National Bylaws)

Guide for Conducting Meetings

[President calls in order of office and chairmen who are present]
Unfinished Business: "Is there any old business for us to consider?" [A motion may be needed to dispose of the matter.]
New Business: "Is there any new business for us to consider?" [All new business must be voted upon before it can become a part of the program of the Society.]
Program: [Speakers are interesting; however, it is more beneficial for members to present programs. These programs should be on the subjects listed in the National Merit Award requirements.]
C.A.R. Song [Everyone stands]. " will lead us in singing the C.A.R. Song."
Benediction: [While standing, everyone reads in unison or Chaplain may choose to give their own benediction.] "May the Lord watch between me and thee, while we are absent from one another."
Announcements:
Next meeting Date (Always)
Adjournment: "I declare the meeting adjourned."

HOW TO MAKE, SECOND, DISCUSS, AND VOTE ON A MOTION

1.	Only Members can make a Motion. If the President wants to make a
	motion, she or he has to have the Vice President take the Chair and then
	takes a seat with the other members. After a second, discussion, any
	amendments [always voted on before the main motion is voted on] and a
	vote, the President then resumes the Chair. "I move that
	{It is not acceptable to just
	say, "I so move."}

- 2. The chair repeats the motion, "It has been moved that _____, is there a second? **Only a Member** can second (or agree to discuss) a motion. If no one seconds the motion, the motion dies for lack of a second.
- 3. If the motion is seconded, the President repeats, "It has been moved and seconded that _______. Is there any discussion?" The President recognizes members who rise and speak for or against the motion. No member can speak more than twice to a motion before all members who would like to speak have had a chance to speak.
- 4. After a reasonable amount of discussion, the President can ask, "Are you ready for the question?" Or a member may say, "I call the question." to call for a vote. A majority (more than half) of the members must agree that they are ready to take a vote. Before taking the vote, the President repeats the motion (including any approved amendments).
- 5. The vote can be a voice vote, a standing vote, or a ballot vote. If any member asks for it, a ballot vote must be taken. If it is hard to tell by a voice vote, then a standing vote or ballot vote should be taken. "All those is favor, say 'Aye." "All those opposed say 'Nay."
- 6. **Decision**: The President then announces the results of the vote, indicating officially if the motion has passed or failed.
- 7. **Reconsider**: A motion can be reconsidered only as long as no irreversible action has already been taken after the motion passed and 2/3 of all voting members agree to re-debate the motion. Only someone who voted on the winning side can ask to re-discuss or debate and then vote on the same motion.
- 8. **An Amendment**: Any member can ask to amend, add on to or change some part of a motion. The President must first ask the person who made the motion if they agree to having their motion amended. If they do, then the Amendment must be seconded, discussed, and passed before it can then be added to the motion on the "table." If the Amendment passes, then the "main" motion is voted on as amended

Tabling a motion: If a member feels there is not enough information or time to properly decide on a motion, they may ask the Chair to Table the Motion until a specified later time. The Chair asks for a second, discussion, and a vote on tabling the motion.

GUIDE FOR INCOMING STATE OFFICERS, CHAIRMEN AND SENIORS

As a newly appointed officer or chairman your should read and understand the North Carolina Society C.A.R. Yearbook, Handbook and Bylaws. The National Handbook, and the National bylaws will also be helpful to you during the course of your term.

Your State President needs your dependability throughout the year so all of his or her plans can be accomplished. Plan to attend the Summer Workshop, Winter Board Meeting, and Annual State Conference. If you are unable to attend tell to your State President and your Senior that you will not be able to attend and forward any contest and report information that you have to your State President and Senior. Communication with your State President and Senior State Officer or Chairman is the key to a successful term.

One of your responsibilities is to create a state contest based on the National Officer's or Chairman's contest. Consult your Senior for guidance to develop your state contest. He or she will give you suggestions and help you stay within the scope of the National Officer's or Chairman's contest. The State Contest should closely follow the National Program. Remember you and your Senior must provide any monetary award responsibility.

When giving your state reports you will need five copies of each to be given to the State President, the Senior State President, the Recording Secretary, your Senior State Officer or Chairman, and yourself. These copies should be typed with the event (Summer Board, etc) and the date at the <u>top</u> and your name and title and your senior's name and title at the <u>bottom</u>. Then you and your senior should sign each copy. You will need to prepare your contest and/or report even if you are unable to attend a meeting and forward three of them to your State President to give to the Senior State President and Recording Secretary and forward a copy to your Senior State Officer or Chairman.

Don't forget that your service to the C.A.R. can count toward community service in school and youth groups. Keep track of your hours and the impact of your programs to get full credit.

Timeline:

- Your term of office begins in April, immediately following the installation of the State President at the National Convention.
- Early Summer (June/July) (when the National packet is released) create your contest.
- Summer Board (August) be prepared to present your contest and report on your C.A.R. activities since State Conference.

- Winter Board (November) be prepared to present a brief report (no more than 2 minutes) on your activities relating to C.A.R since Summer Board as well as encouraging local societies to enter your contest.
- Before State Conference (early March) judge the contest entries with your senior.
- Annual State Conference (March) be prepared to present a brief report (no more than 2 minutes) about your activities related to C.A.R. for the entire year.
- Your term of office ends in April with the installation of the new State President (at the National Convention) which begins the new term.

Note: Your reports should be limited to events and activities that are related to C.A.R only and be written in 3rd person.

Remember to ask questions. If you do not understand your responsibilities ask your State President, Senior State President, and/or Senior State Officer or Chairman for help.

Above all, have **FUN!** This is *your* organization and you should be proud that you are helping promote the Objectives of the Children of the American Revolution.

Additional Information for Incoming Senior State Officers and Chairmen

Your term of office is two years concurrent with the Senior State President's term. Your responsibility is to guide your member in accomplishing his or her goals and responsibilities. Please review the responsibilities of your member. Communicate with your member on a regular basis and encourage them to ask you questions about their responsibilities. This is the key to having a successful and productive year. Remember not to do their job for them. If you have questions about your responsibilities, ask your Senior State President.

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BYLAWS

NORTH CAROLINA SOCIETY CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I. Name

The name of this Society shall be the North Carolina Society of the Children of the American Revolution.

Article II. Object

The object of this Society shall be:

- (1) To acquire knowledge of American History.
- (2) To preserve and restore places of Historical importance associated with men and women who forwarded American Independence.
- (3) To ascertain the deeds and honor the memories of the men, women, and children who rendered service to the cause of the American Revolution.
- (4) To promote the celebration of patriotic anniversaries.
- (5) To honor and cherish the Flag of the United States of America above every other flag.
- (6) To love, uphold, and extend the principles of American liberty and patriotism.

Article III. Eligibility

Any child or youth under the age of twenty-one years is eligible for membership in The North Carolina Society of the Children of the American Revolution who is lineally descended from a man or woman who, with unfailing loyalty, rendered material aid to the cause of American Independence as a soldier, sailor, civil officer, or recognized patriot in one of the several Colonies or States, or of the United States provided that the applicant is personally acceptable to the Society.

Article IV. Membership

Section 1. An applicant for membership in a Local Society shall present to the Senior Society President an application showing descent and Revolutionary service of an ancestor from whom the claim to membership is made. The application shall be endorsed by two members in good standing of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Sons of the American Revolution or Sons of the Revolution, or by one such and one Children of the American Revolution member, and signed by the officers of the Local Society. The proposed member shall be known personally to the endorsers. The application shall be sent by the Senior Society President to N.S.C.A.R. head-quarters with a check for the application fee plus National dues made payable to the Senior National Treasurer.

Section 2. A member of the Children of the American Revolution in good standing, desiring to become a member of the Daughters of the

American Revolution or Sons of the Revolution, after their eighteenth birthday and before their twenty-second birthday, shall, upon proper application, be issued a certificate attesting membership in good standing by the National Society. The certificate may be presented to the respective society in lieu of application fee or initiation fee. The certificate shall be valid for one year from the date issued, except if the member has passed the twenty-first birthday, the certificate shall be valid only until the twenty-second birthday. To be entitled to such certificate, a member shall have been in good standing for at least one year immediately prior to issuance.

Section 3. A member of the Children of the American Revolution in good standing, desiring to become a member of the Sons of the American Revolution shall, upon proper application, be issued a certificate attesting membership in good standing by the National Society. The certificate may be presented to the Sons of the American Revolution in lieu of application fee. The certificate shall be valid for one year from the date issued, except if the member has passed their twenty-first birthday, the certificate shall be valid only until their twenty-second birthday. To be entitled to such certificate, a member shall have been in good standing for at least one year immediately prior to issuance.

Section 4. A member who has membership in the North Carolina Society of the Children of the American Revolution (N.C.S.C.A.R.) and the National Society Sons of the American Revolution (NSSAR) is a C.A.R./SAR dual member. Such dual C.A.R./SAR members are required to pay dues to the North Carolina Society of the Children of the American Revolution, their Local C.A.R. Society, and the North Carolina Society Sons of the American Revolution (NCSSAR). At no time will the N.C.S.C.A.R. be bound by the bylaws or rules of the NCSSAR or NSSAR.

Section 5. Members reaching the age of twenty-two years shall be automatically removed from the rolls by the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution.

Article V. Officers

Section 1. The State Officers of the North Carolina Society shall be State President, State Vice President, State Chaplain, State Recording Secretary, State Organizing Secretary, State Corresponding Secretary, State Treasurer, State Registrar, State Historian, State Librarian, and State Curator.

Section 2. The Senior State Officers of the North Carolina Society shall be Senior State President, Senior State Vice President, Senior State Chaplain, Senior State Recording Secretary, Senior State Organizing Secretary, Senior State Corresponding Secretary, Senior State Treasurer, Senior State Registrar, Senior State Historian, Senior State Librarian, and Senior State Curator. The Senior State President shall appoint a Parliamentarian, who shall be a Senior.

Section 3. A member having served as State President may be elected at an Annual State Conference an Honorary State President for life, in recognition of valuable service to the State Society, with the privilege of voting at board meetings and State Conference until membership in the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution is terminated. Nomination shall be from the floor at the Annual State Conference. Election may be by voice vote.

Section 4. Anyone having served as Senior State President may be elected an Honorary Senior State President for life, in recognition of valuable service to the State Society. Nomination shall be from the floor at the Senior State Board Meeting at the Annual State Conference. Election shall be by voice vote of a majority of qualified Seniors. An Honorary Senior State President shall have all the privileges of a Senior State Officer so long as in good standing in the National Society through which qualified for Senior Officer service.

Article VI. Nomination, Election and Appointment of State Officers

Section 1. The State President shall be elected at the Annual State Conference for a term of one year by a majority vote of qualified C.A.R. members present and voting. To be eligible for office, the nominee must be fourteen years of age or over and shall have been a member in good standing of the North Carolina Society of the Children of the American Revolution for at least two years and shall have served as a Local Society President or one term as a State Officer.

Section 2. The other State Officers shall be elected for a term of one year at the Annual State Conference by majority vote of qualified C.A.R. members present and voting. They shall have been members in good standing of the North Carolina Society Children of the American Revolution for at least one year prior to holding office. State Officers must be at least ten years of age.

Section 3. A member whose twenty-second (22nd) birthday will occur prior to the end of the term shall not be eligible to be nominated for office.

Section 4. The State President, after consultation with the Senior State President, shall appoint by October 1 a Nominating Committee composed of three members from three different societies. The Nominating Committee shall nominate candidates for office to be filled by election at the Annual State Conference. No more than two candidates shall be nominated for each office. The written consent of the candidates and their parents shall be obtained. The slate shall be forwarded to the State and Senior State Board in writing six weeks before the Annual State Conference. Upon publication of the slate, a candidate may not run for any other office that year. Nominations from the floor may be made, provided the consent of the nominee and parents has been obtained and submitted to the Senior State President with a letter of good standing from the Senior State Treasurer seven days prior to the day of election. The Senior State President shall act as advisor to the Nominating Committee.

Section 5. Election shall be by ballot and all names will appear on the ballot prior to distribution. A simple majority shall elect. Where there is only one nominee for an office, the nominee may be elected by acclamation, if so moved.

Section 6.

a. The Senior State President or designate shall appoint a Tellers Committee consisting of five seniors representing different societies. These appointments shall be made at least three days prior to the Annual State Conference.

b. No one shall enter the ballot room except voting delegates. Absolutely no talking will be permitted in the ballot room once voting has begun. The Chairman of Tellers shall be in charge of the ballot room.

Section 7. The State Officers shall be installed at the Annual State Conference, except the State President, who is installed at the National Convention. All State Officers shall assume their duties immediately following the close of the National Convention.

Section 8. Vacancies in State Offices shall be filled by the State President after consultation with the Senior State President.

Article VII. Nomination, Election and Appointment of Senior State Officers

Section 1. The Senior State President and Senior State Vice President shall be a member in good standing of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Sons of the American Revolution, or the Sons of the Revolution in the State of North Carolina. A Senior State Nominating Committee working with the outgoing Senior State President may make a recommendation to the outgoing Senior State President. The outgoing Senior State President shall forward his/her recommendation for the incoming Senior State President to the Senior National President for appointment pursuant to Article IX, Section 2. H. of the National Bylaws. The Senior National President shall appoint the incoming Senior State President after consultation with the outgoing Senior State President and consideration of recommendations of the DAR State Regent, and the State Presidents of the SAR and the SR. Confirmation of appointment is made by the Senior National Board of Management. The term of office shall be for two years. The officer is eligible for one reappointment by the Senior National President subject to confirmation by the Senior National Board of Management. The Senior State President shall be installed at the National Convention with the term of office beginning at installation.

Section 2. The Senior State Nominating Committee (see Section 3, Article VII for details of Committee) working closely with the Senior State President shall recommend the Senior State Officers. The Senior State President, taking into account these recommendations, shall appoint the Senior State Officers for the coming term. The term of office shall be for two years and shall be concurrent with that of the Senior State President. The Senior State President, working closely with the Senior State Board, may make mid-term changes to the Senior State Board to reflect changes in the member board.

Section 3. The Senior State President shall appoint a Senior State Nominating Committee at the Senior State Board meeting following the Annual State Conference or no later than April 30, in the year preceding the end of the current Senior State President's term of office. The Senior State Nominating Committee shall consist of three (3) members. The Senior State Nominating Committee shall recommend candidates for Senior State Offices The Senior State Nominating Committee shall be available until a new Senior State Nominating Committee is appointed should there be a need to fill a vacancy in the Senior State President's position.

Section 4. Vacancies in the Senior State Officers shall be filled by the Senior State President, except that of the Senior State President, which shall be filled in accordance with Article IX, Section 2.H. of the National Bylaws.

Article VIII. Duties of State Officers and State Chairmen

Section 1. All State Officers are expected to conduct themselves in a respectful, honorable, considerate and conscientious manner at all times. The State Officers, as the leaders of the State Society, are the role models from which younger members learn. A State Officer must be a positive example for all members to admire and emulate. All State Officers shall perform the duties appropriate to the office, assist the respective Senior State Officer and read the joint report, approved and signed by the respective Senior State Officer, at the State Conference. Other Duties may be assigned by the State President, the Senior State President and the respective Senior State Officer.

Section 2. State President: The State President, under supervision and approval of the Senior State President, has the privilege and the responsibility to:

- A. Plan the emphasis for the year and develop objectives toward which to work
- B. Call, prepare agenda and preside at meetings of the State Board and all sessions of the State Conference
- C. Attend meetings of the Senior State Board.
- D. Attend National Convention, National Board Meetings and Southeastern Regional Meetings
- E. Foster close relationships with the DAR, SAR, SR and other patriotic organizations.
- E. Represent the State Society on appropriate occasions.
- F. Appoint State Chairmen.
- G. Appoint all committees.
- H. Serve as a member ex-officio of all committees except the Nominating Committee.
- I. Conduct necessary communication with members of the State Board and State Chairmen.

Section 3. State Vice President: The State Vice President shall preside in the absence of the State President and perform such duties as may be assigned by the State President, Senior State President or Senior State Vice President.

Section 4. State Chaplain: The State Chaplain shall perform duties required by the office which include offering appropriate prayers at all meetings of the State Board and State Conference, conducting the Annual Memorial and Installation Services together with the Senior State Chaplain and writing notes of condolence.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary: The State Recording Secretary, with the assistance of the Senior State Recording Secretary, shall perform all duties required by the office which include recording the actions taken at all meetings of the State Board and the Annual State Conference,

and reading the minutes at all meetings. The State Recording Secretary shall submit the minutes to the Senior State Recording Secretary.

Section 6. State Organizing Secretary: The State Organizing Secretary shall perform duties required by the office which include assisting the Senior State Organizing Secretary in keeping a record of Local Societies being organized and promoting the organization of new societies.

Section 7. State Corresponding Secretary: The State Corresponding Secretary shall perform duties required by the office, which include sending the call to meetings of the State Board and the Annual State Conference.

Section 8. State Treasurer: The State Treasurer shall perform duties required by the office including assisting with those outlined for the Senior State Treasurer.

Section 9. State Registrar: The State Registrar shall perform duties required by the office which include promoting membership and keeping a list of all members of the Society.

Section 10. State Historian: The State Historian shall perform duties required by the office which include promoting and encouraging historical work in the State and Local Societies and compiling a State Scrapbook.

Section 11. State Librarian: The State Librarian shall perform duties required by the office which include promoting the Library and encouraging members and friends to support the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution Library.

Section 12. State Curator: The State Curator shall perform duties required by the office which include promoting the Museum and encouraging members and friends to support the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution Museum.

Section 13. State Chairmen: The State Chairmen shall perform the duties appropriate to the office, assist the respective Senior State Chairman and read the joint report, approved and signed by the respective Senior State Chairman, at the State Board meetings and the Annual State Conference.

Article IX. Duties of Senior State Officers

Section 1. All Senior State Officers are expected to conduct themselves in a respectful, honorable, considerate and conscientious manner at all times. The Senior State Officers, as the leaders of the State Society, are the role models from which all members learn. A Senior State Officer must be a positive example for members to admire and emulate. All Senior State Officers shall perform the duties appropriate to the office, assist and advise the respective State Officer. Other Duties may be assigned by the Senior State President. Each Senior State Officer shall have the additional responsibility to attend meetings of the Senior State Board, perform such duties as the Senior State President may require, report to the Senior State Board as the office requires, and prepare a written annual report to be incorporated in the report to be presented at the State Conference by the corresponding State Officer.

Section 2. Senior State President: The Senior State President shall have general supervision of the State organization and has the privilege and responsibility to:

- A. Advise and counsel the State President.
- B. Call, prepare agenda and preside at all meetings of the Senior State Board.
- C Attend Senior National Board of Management, State and Senior State Board and Regional Meetings.
- D Make arrangements for State Conference or delegate to a conference chairman.
- E. Appoint Senior State Officers after considering recommendations of the Senior State Nominating Committee and appoint Senior State Chairmen.
- F Appoint all Senior committees.
- G Serve as a member ex-officio of all Senior committees, except the Senior State Nominating Committee
- H. Appoint all Senior Society Presidents and Senior Organizing Presidents subject to confirmation by the Senior National Board of Management.
- I. Forward to DAR State Recording Secretary information for incorporation in the DAR State Yearbook as required.
- J. Call to order the State Board Meetings and Annual State Conference and present the State President, who will preside.

Section 3. Senior State Vice President: The Senior State Vice President shall preside in the absence or inability of the Senior State President and perform such duties as may be assigned by the Senior State President or Senior State Board. The Senior State Vice President is responsible for managing the application and decision process for the Fleming Scholarship as spelled out in the handbook. The Senior State Vice President may represent the State at Senior National Board of Management meetings in place of the Senior State President as defined in Article 11, Section 1 of the National Bylaws.

Section 4. Senior State Chaplain: The Senior State Chaplain shall offer the opening prayer at all meetings of the Senior State Board, keep a record of all deaths and report deaths to the Senior National Chaplain. The Senior State Chaplain shall assist the State Chaplain in conducting a memorial service at the Annual State Conference for a Member, Senior State Officer, Senior State Chairman, Senior Society President or Life Promoter. The Senior State Chaplain shall write notes of condolence.

Section 5. Senior State Recording Secretary: The Senior State Recording Secretary shall maintain a permanent record of all meetings of the State Board, Senior State Board and Annual State Conference. The Senior State Recording Secretary shall record the actions taken at all meetings of the Senior State Board and assist the State Recording Secretary. The Senior State Recording Secretary shall send a copy of the minutes to the Senior State President and State President, immediately following each meeting.

Section 6. Senior State Organizing Secretary: The Senior State Organizing Secretary shall keep a record of Societies being organized, pro-

mote the organization of new societies and encourage membership.

Section 7. Senior State Corresponding Secretary: The Senior State Corresponding Secretary shall give due notice of all meetings of the Senior State Board, assist the State Corresponding Secretary in sending notices of the State Board meetings and Annual State Conference. The Senior State Corresponding Secretary shall attend to any correspondence as the Senior State President may direct.

Section 8. Senior State Treasurer: The Senior State Treasurer shall:

- A. Have charge of all funds of the Society.
- B. Supervise the collection of all funds and deposit the same to the credit of the North Carolina Society Children of the American Revolution in financial institutions approved by the Senior State Board.
- C Supervise the disbursement of all funds as authorized by the Senior State Board or the Senior State President.
- D. Prepare an annual budget for the State Society to be presented at Summer Board for approval. The Senior State Treasurer shall work with the Senior State President and other designees to create the budget. The budget shall be read at Summer Board by the State Treasurer.
- E. Prepare reports for each State Board Meeting and Annual State Conference to be read by the State Treasurer.
- F. Make available to the Senior State Board, upon request, accounts or correspondence.
- G. Submit all financial records to a committee of at least two, appointed by the Senior State President, at the time of a new Senior State Treasurer assuming the office.
- H. Notify Local Societies of their dues and obligations before November 1.
- I. Transfer to the incoming Senior State Treasurer all funds and materials pertaining to the office by May 1.

Section 9. Senior State Registrar: The Senior State Registrar shall keep a record of all members of the North Carolina State Society. The record shall include name, address, date of birth, national number, and date of admission to the National Society.

Section 10. Senior State Historian: The Senior State Historian shall assist the State Historian in the compilation of the State Scrapbook and promote and encourage historical work in the State and Local Societies..

Section 11. Senior State Librarian: The Senior State Librarian shall assist the State Librarian. The Senior State Librarian shall be in charge of soliciting funds and gifts for the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution Library in accordance with the guidelines set by the Senior National Board of Management.

Section 12. Senior State Curator: The Senior State Curator shall

assist the State Curator. The Senior State Curator shall be in charge of soliciting funds and gifts for the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution Museum in accordance with the guidelines set by the Senior National Board of Management.

Section 13. Senior State Chairmen: The Senior State Chairmen shall perform the duties appropriate to the office and assist the respective State Chairman who reads the joint report, approved and signed by the respective Senior State Chairman, at the Annual State Conference.

Article X. State Board

Section 1. The State Officers, Honorary State Presidents, current National Officers, who are members of the North Carolina Society, and Society Presidents shall constitute the State Board.

Section 2. The State Board shall meet at least two times each year. Special meetings of the State Board may be called at any time by the State President or shall be called upon the written request of five members of the State Board. Notice of the business to be transacted shall be given in the call for a special meeting. The State Board and Senior State Board may choose to hold joint meetings. These joint meetings must be announced in advance and must follow the standing rules.

Section 3. Five members shall constitute a quorum. The Senior State President shall attend all meetings as an advisor.

Section 4. State Chairmen may attend the State Board Meeting, upon invitation of the State President, with voice but without the privilege of voting.

Section 5. The State Board shall present recommendations for projects, resolutions, and other business to the Senior State Board for approval.

Article XI. Senior State Board

Section 1. The Senior State Officers, Honorary Senior State Presidents, current Senior National Officers, residing in North Carolina, and Senior Society Presidents shall comprise the Senior State Board.

Section 2. The Senior State Board shall meet at least two times each year. Special meetings of the Senior State Board may be called at any time by the Senior State President or shall be called upon written request of five members of the Senior State Board. Notice of the business to be transacted shall be given in the call for a special meeting. The State Board and Senior State Board may choose to hold joint meetings. These joint meetings must be announced in advance and must follow the standing rules.

Section 3. Five members shall constitute a quorum. The State President may attend with voice, but without the privilege of voting.

Section 4. The Senior State Chairmen may attend the Senior State Board Meeting, upon invitation of the Senior State President, with voice but without the privilege of voting.

Section 5. The Senior State Board shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the State Society during the interim between its meetings. The Senior State Board cannot modify any action taken at the Annual

State Conference.

Article XII. State Conference

Section 1. The North Carolina Society shall hold an annual State Conference for the purpose of receiving reports from State Officers, State Chairman and Society Presidents; for election of State Officers and for any other business that may arise. The time and place of the Conference shall be determined by the State and Senior State Boards.

Section 2. The delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be members in good standing of the Local, State and National Society, having paid dues for the current calendar year on or before January 1.

Section 3. The voters of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, Honorary State Presidents, who are currently members (Article V Section 3), Society Presidents and delegates. Local Societies shall be entitled to delegates and alternates in the following ratio:

Section 4. A registration fee for members, adults, and guests shall be required for attendance at the State Conference.

Section 5. Fifteen members shall constitute a quorum.

Article XIII. Dues, Fees and Funds

Section 1. The amount of annual state dues for members shall be listed in the Society's Handbook and are payable to the Senior State Treasurer on or before January 1. Dues of members admitted after July 1 shall be considered paid for the ensuing calendar year. The annual dues amount may be changed by the State and Senior State Board at their meeting prior to the Annual State Conference.

Section 2. The Senior Society President of each local society shall pay an annual State fee to the Senior State Treasurer on or before January 1. The amount of the annual fee shall be listed in the Society's Handbook. The annual fee amount may be changed by the State and Senior State Board at their meeting prior to the Annual State Conference.

Section 3. A State Patriot is an individual who wishes to support the North Carolina Society. The annual fee for a State Patriot shall be listed in the Society's Handbook.

Section 4. These annual dues and fees shall constitute the General Fund to be used for the legitimate expenses of the State Society.

Section 5. The Society may maintain funds in addition to the Gen-

eral Fund for specific purposes. The purpose and rules for these funds shall be detailed in the Society's Handbook.

Article XIV Organizing Societies (pursuant to Article XV of the National Bylaws).

Section 1. Any DAR, SAR or SR member in good standing who desires to organize or to reorganize a society may present her or his name to the Senior State President. The Senior State President shall submit the name of the Senior Organizing President to the Senior National Organizing Secretary for consideration and confirmation by the Senior National Board of Management. The number of Local Societies in a city or town shall not be limited and may be as many as the Senior National Board of Management may authorize.

Section 2. The appointment of a Senior Organizing President shall expire if no society is formed within one year. Upon the request of the Senior State President the appointment may be extended for one additional year. Upon completion of organization or reorganization, the Senior Organizing President, at the discretion of the Senior State President, may be appointed Senior Society President for a term of two years. Organization shall be complete upon filing a Report of Organization with the Senior National Board of Management.

Section 3 Members: Six NEW members shall be required to organize a society. To reorganize a society, any six members in good standing are required. For purposes of organization, members at large who have never affiliated with a Local Society shall be considered NEW members. Prior to confirmation of the organization of a society by the Senior National Board of Management, only the signature of the endorsers and the Senior Organizing President shall be required on applications. After organization, the Senior Society President, the Society President, Recording Secretary and Registrar shall sign all applications. All applications shall be endorsed by two members of either the DAR, SAR, SR or one such and one member in good standing of the National Society of the C.A.R.

Section 4 Name: A name shall be selected for a society and sent with a history of the name to the Senior National Organizing Secretary for confirmation by the Senior National Board of Management in time for the society to be named when organized. Local Societies shall be named for persons, places or events of historical association with America prior to 1825. Names of children or youths who served the cause of American Independence may be chosen when practicable. A name, once approved, may be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the Senior National Board of Management. No society may adopt a name in current use.

Section 5: Officers: At the Organizing Meeting, election or appointment of officers shall be made. The President and Officers of a Local Society shall be members in good standing of the National Society. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Local Society beginning at the time the President is installed at the Organizing Meeting.

Article XV. Duties of Societies

Every Society in the State shall:

A. Send notices to the Senior State President and to the Senior State Corresponding Secretary of the election of Society Offic-

ers.

- B. Send to the Senior State President and to the Senior State Treasurer, the Society's Credentials form for State Conference.
- C. Send to the Senior State President and to the National Chairman of Credentials for the National Convention, the names and addresses of the Delegates and Alternates who are to represent the Society at the National Convention.
- D. Send without delay to the Senior State Registrar and the Senior State President all changes in Society membership including new members, reinstatement, resignations, transfers, notice of marriage, death and address changes.
- E. Send without delay to the Senior State Chaplain and Senior State President notices of the death of any Society member, senior leader, sponsor and/or financial supporter.
- F. Pay to the Senior State Treasurer on or before the first day of January of each year, the dues of the Society members for the fiscal year beginning the first day of March following.

Article XVI. Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in the current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* shall govern the Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws and any special rules of order the Society may adopt and the Bylaws of the National Society Children of the American Revolution.

Article XVII. Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended at an Annual State Conference by two-thirds vote of the voters present, a quorum being present. The amendment shall have been presented in writing and read at a meeting of the State and Senior State Board at least ninety days before the Annual State Conference, authorized by the State and Senior State Boards and approved by the Parliamentarian for the National Society.

Article XVIII. Dissolution

Although the period of duration of the society is perpetual, if for any reason the society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the society. Upon the dissolution of the society, assets shall be distributed by the Senior State Board to and only to the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed exclusively to the National Society Children of the American Revolution organized and operated within the meaning of section 501(c) 3 with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the state organization.
