We hope you will be able to attend the Summer Board meeting in Cherokee on August 9 so you can visit the Cherokee Indian Museum, see the New Kituwah Academy, and learn about the history and culture of the Cherokee. I will be providing information soon, after visiting the area to make the arrangements. Make this a fun family weekend in the mountains. The Southeastern Regional meeting will be July 14 & 15 in Peachtree City, Georgia (near Atlanta). It would be great to have a good representation from our State at this meeting. Information on this event is included in this issue and I encourage you to go ahead and make your room reservation if you plan to attend.

Let’s go forward with excitement and enthusiasm as we “*Rebuild the Fire*” in our State Society.

State Conference

The 74th Annual State Conference was held at the Sheraton Hotel in Chapel Hill March 21-23, 2014, beginning with a Board Meeting on Friday evening. The meeting was called to order by Senior State President, Bryan Jones. Mr. Jones introduced State President, Audria Vickers, who presided.

Audria welcomed the members and Camille Edwards, State Chaplain, gave the invocation. Ashlyn Seaboch led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Sarah Peterson, State Recording Secretary, moved to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the last State Board meeting, since they were published in the *Tarheel Tattler*. Audrey Ditmore, State Historian, seconded the motion and it passed.

For new business Elizabeth Cox, State Treasurer, moved to contribute \$500 of the generous \$1000 SAR donation to the State President's Project (*Caring for our Heroes*) and the remaining \$500 be placed in the General Fund to help pay for State Conference expenses. The motion was seconded by Audrey Ditmore and passed. Audria briefly explained her project *Caring for our Heroes* to help Wags4Tags provide companion dogs for veterans with PTSD.

Georgia Ditmore, Awards Chairman, explained the process

by which awards would be presented and she told members about the Silent Auction.

Audria gave a few reminders about the meeting Saturday. Alexandria Swaim read the announcements. The meeting was adjourned and the members went to the hospitality suite for pizza.

The Saturday morning business session was called to order by the Senior State President, Bryan Jones. Mr. Jones introduced Audria Vickers who presided.

State Chaplain, Camille Edwards, gave the invocation. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Madeleine Meadows. Audrey Ditmore led the Star Spangled Banner. State Treasurer, Elizabeth Cox, read the first report of the Credentials Committee. The Standing Rules were read by Alexandria Swaim, who moved

Officer reports were given by Senior State President, Bryan Jones; State President, Audria Vickers; State Vice-President, Lee Utter; State Chaplain, Camille Edwards; State Recording Secretary, Sarah Peterson; State Treasurer, Elizabeth Cox; State Registrar, Madeleine Meadows; State Historian, Audrey Ditmore; State Librarian, Alexandria Swaim; and State Curator, Max Guest. Winners of the contests were announced after each report and are printed on page 18.

Archives; Langley Kinlaw, Government Studies; Charles Meadows, Kids Helping Kids; Ashlyn Seaboch, Membership; Haley Seaboch, National President's Project; Daisy Dolicker, Gift Shop; Lee Utter,

Lee Utter gave the report of the Nominating Committee, which was followed by the campaign speeches.

A Memorial Service was conducted by State Chaplain, Camille Edwards and Senior State Chaplain Patrick Crist for Mrs. Juanita Williams, who passed away at age 101. Mrs. Williams was a constant supporter of C.A.R. and the members of the Dr. Robert Williams Society, where she served as Senior Society

President. The service was also held for David Rees, Honorary State President, who had been a member of the Dr. Robert Williams Society.

Announcements were given by Lee Utter and the meeting recessed for lunch.

After lunch, the meeting resumed in the Venetian Room. Elizabeth Cox read the second report of the Credentials Committee. The Tellers were asked to come forward to be sworn in. The tellers were Gary Horne (Chief Teller), Sam Powell, Karen Powell, Ann Jones and Kristy Seaboch. The oath to the Tellers was given by Camille Edwards and the Tellers were dismissed to prepare for voting. Madeleine Meadows read the roll call for voting. Vice President Lee Utter assumed the chair while the State President voted. He nominated

Audria Vickers as Honorary State President and she was elected. Gary Horne announced the results of the election. Since all candidates were unopposed, they were all elected. The list of elected officers is on page 25. A motion was made and adopted to destroy the ballots.

Announcements were read and the meeting recessed until the Awards Banquet. In the afternoon members toured the Duke Lemur center.

The Awards Banquet kicked off at 6:30 PM. Following the procession of State Officers and Pages, Max Guest led the Pledge of Allegiance; Mary Lee Howell led the American's Creed, Justin Vickers the C.A.R. Creed and the colors were posted. The blessing was given by Camille Edwards and everyone enjoyed their meal. The State President introduced the State Officers and Chairmen. She also introduced the distinguished guests including: Gary Horne, Senior National Corresponding Secretary; Gregg McCullough, Senior State

Lee Utter moved to give \$200 of the \$565 donation from the DAR to the Outgoing State President for National Convention expenses and \$100 to any member running for National Office. The motion was seconded by Georgia Ditmore and adopted.

Lee Utter moved that the

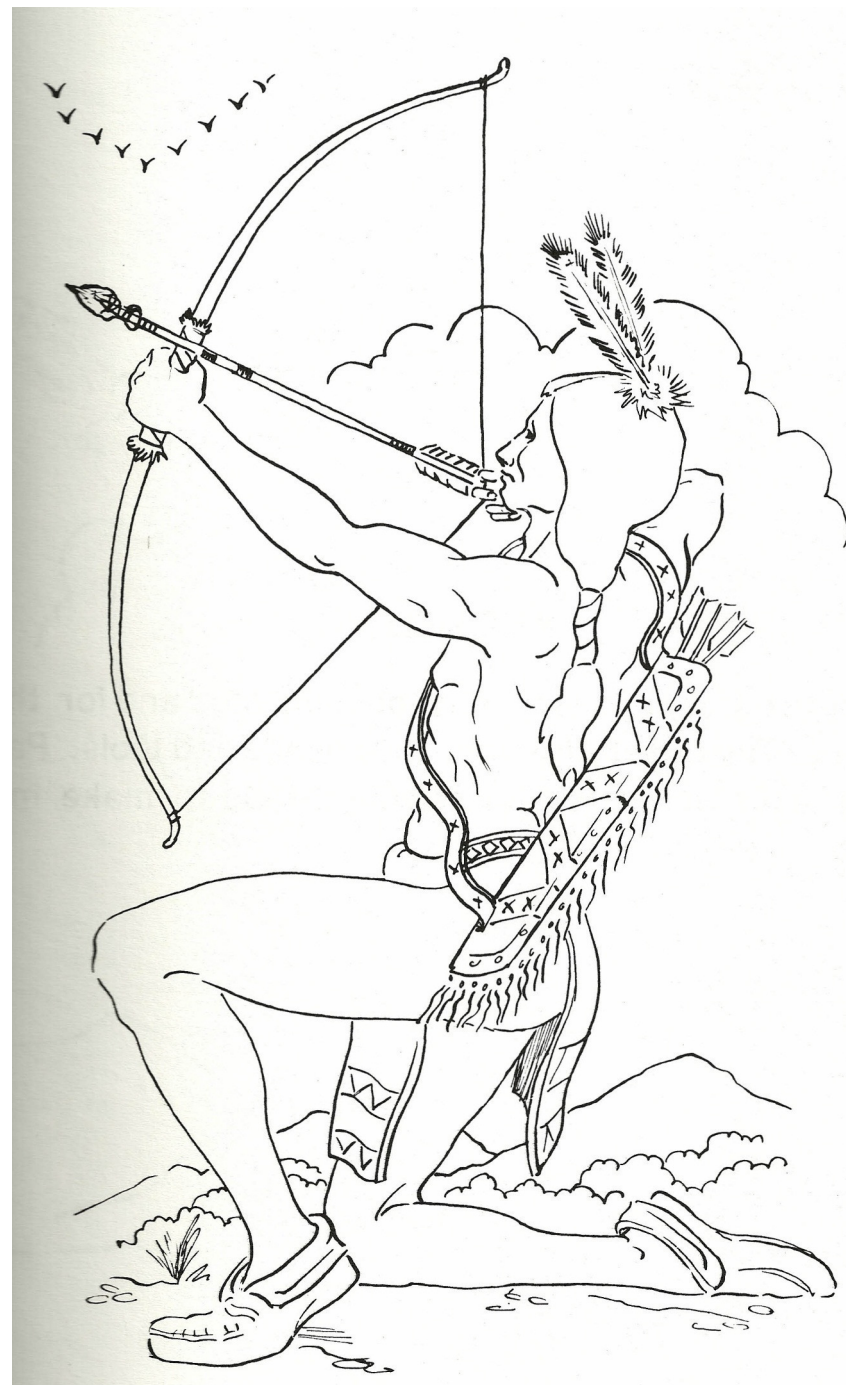
remaining \$265 of the DAR donation be paid to the outgoing State President for C.A.R. expenses. The motion was seconded by Georgia Ditmore and adopted.

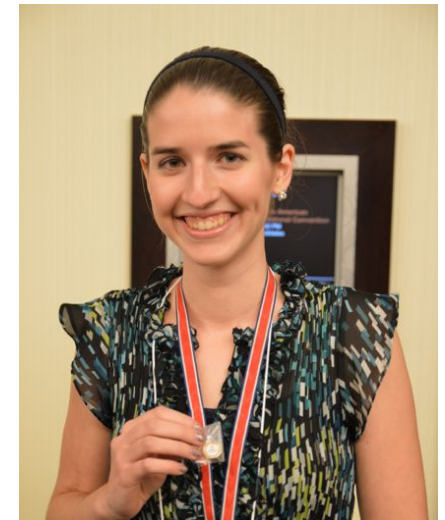

Although the Cherokee tribe has worked hard to preserve their heritage, a recent study showed there are only 460 fluent Cherokee speakers left in the East and 72% of them are over 50 and some are in ill health. Since much of the Native American culture and folklore is passed down orally, once these speakers are gone, much more than their language will be lost. A key component of "Rebuilding the Fire" of the Cherokee nation is the New Kituwah Academy, which currently serves 90 children ages 7 months to 10 years in an effort to save their way of life.

Gov. Alexander Martin Society

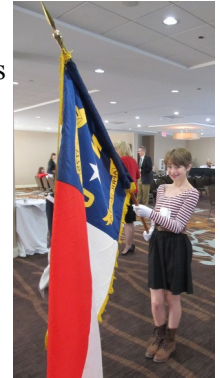
